Preserving the History of Idyllwild and Neighboring Communities in the San Jacinto Mountains

A Delightful Surprise!

ur latest acquistion, pictured here, is a charming covered wagon model crafted by Claudius Lee Emerson and donated by Mrs. Ann Smith

of Bakersfield. Emerson made the wagon for his sister, Mrs. Smith's grandmother, Mary Elizabeth Emerson Warner, in 1920's or early 1930's. The wagon is a replica of the one that his family used on their way west. Complete in every detail, the brakes work, the front axle turns, and the linen like fabric is still intact. The accessories include a child's cradle, cooking pots, an oxen yoke, water barrel, and a miniature frying pan which was a souvenir from the 1915 Panama Pacific Exposition in San Francisco.

In 1917, Claudius Lee Emerson, his brother and two oth-

ers bought the Idyllwild Inn and 1000 acres in the surrounding area from Strong and Dickinson. The Emersons bought out the others and for twenty-one years the Idyllwild Inn was an Emerson family operation, with Claudius Lee in charge. The Inn became the social center of Strawberry Valley.

Emerson's dream was to make Idyllwild one of the premier resorts in Southern California. To build his "dream community," Emerson donated land to the Boy Scouts, (Camp Emerson), religious groups and to Riverside County for a public campground. Thirteen acres were donated for the Idyllwild Pines religious school in 1928.

During the 1920's, Emerson's Idyllwild Incorporated

offered half-acre home sites for \$350. 114 homesites were sold during a two year period. More were sold later.


Our present museum located at 54470 N. Circle is on a half acre parcel which Emerson owned and later sold to Della Ferguson in 1922. Our Society has the original bill of sale for this transaction.

Claudius Lee and Zelma had five children: Marjorie, Nell, Alice, John and Lee Jr. John, residing in Colorado and Lee Emerson in Piedmont, CA are members of our Society.

The covered wagon was brought to our attention by Phyllis Marling who is the great niece of Claudius Lee and a cousin of Ann Smith's. Thanks to both Phyllis and Ann, "The Emerson Legacy" display in our museum will be greatly enhanced by this gift.



Museum Update!

Things are happening in the Museum building. The office/archive is finished and up and running with a staff of dedicated, fun and hard working volunteers. Now that the office can be left in their very capable hands, another group of volunteers are turning their skills and talents to the restoration of the main building.

For you members who have not had the opportunity to drive by your museum property, a new rustic split-rail fence has been added to encompass the property. Volunteers Richard and Carolyn Levitski, Joe Hart, Don and Lynnda Hart gamely took up the challenge, along with a very powerful and determined gasoline driven post-hole digger and managed to define the large park area in from of the museum in a day and a half!

Heady with the success of that challenge, some of us are moving on to what "Volunteer of the Year", Richard Levitski, calls The List. Armed with volunteers, we will be restoring the beautiful old window casings, polishing walls and windows, installing doors, scrubbing the fireplace stones, building displays, installing a security system, exhibits and installing exhibit lighting. Three issues the Board decided needed outside expertise were the aged fir floor, fireplace hearth and heat. We have been blessed on all three accounts but for different reasons. The floor company did a fantastic job of replacing old broken boards, sanding, coloring and sealing. Member and stonemason, Charlie Clayton, laid a beautiful new hearth, matching the existing fireplace front, as a donation. Kretsinger Plumbing and Village Hardward donated labor and materials in preperation for heating. The problem of heating our buildings was solved by the very generous donation by Idyllwild Heating of a fireplace insert for the museum and a wall unit for the office/archive. When we open, our members and visitors will be not only be warm but in beautiful surroundings, too!

Memories of Idyllwild by Marion K. Snidecor

I first saw Idyllwild July 3rd 1894. Hemet High School was held in San Jacinto for 2 yrs. pending the building in Hemet and the whole High School which was held over until July camped in Strawberry Valley for 2 days. It was my first experience with camping and the bonfires, moonlight nights, hikes were long to be remembered. Among the party were Maud and Blanche Saunders, Cecil Huntoon, Fred Fairchilds, Albert Rheinhart, Arthur Wright, Lupe and Estella Estudillo, Alda and Bessie Whetlock, Fred Morris and myself, then Marion Kimmell. We camped in front of the Strawberry Valley Hotel near where the school house now stands. Idyllwild was then a group of cottages near where the stables are now located. The following summer I visited the Whitlocks in Idyllwild, and remember one night one of the familiar characters around there jumped to the middle of the dance floor and began firing pistols into the air. We all scattered.

The bonfires at night were the crown of the day. Ira Hards who took the part of "The Little Minister" in a New York play gave reading as did

also his sister.

I have climbed the mountain in a variety of ways, lumber wagon, mule team, horseback, tallyho, even walked up from the foot of the trail over the old switchbacks, waited hours for the auto control

and maybe sometime I'll fly.

I left Hemet in 1908, and in 1917 my husband, Geo. E. Snidecor and I made a trip up to the peak. Returning hot and tired, we sat down to rest under a group of 3 old cedars. A lovely cool breeze seemed to be playing around that locality. The next day we visited the same spot again, and the same cool breeze greeted us. My husband went back to the hotel, wrapped the little cool breeze in a deed to the lot and carried it home in his pocket as a surrise to me. And we always had the little cool breeze at "The House by the Side of the Road". We built the cabin in 1918 - a little shack that was always bulging at the seams with happy company. Our boys, John & Elwyn are better men for the lesson this old mountain taught them.

Soon Coronans joined us. The Glasses, Andrews, Willetts, Joy & T.C. Jamesons, Claysons, Mullers all built cabins. At one time we banded together and entertained the old country club (60 people) for 3 days.

Our cottage was headquarters for the searching parties who combed the mts. for Harold Johnson, who was separated from a boy scout group at the peak, but who finally found his own way down the desert side to

the Fish Hatchery.

Coronans have loved Idyllwild, but for one reason or another they have cased coming, and their cabins are owned by someone else, except the Joy Jamesons, Glasses, Andrews and now the Bogles own the Snidecor Cabin.


