A TALE OF TWO FAMILIES

Keeping in mind that there were only about 450 full time residents living here at the end of WWII, Idyllwild has always been a very small place, but to those who have lived here at one time or another, that's never been a problem; quite the contrary, because, along with the trees and the beauty, it's exactly why we choose to live here. And most of us hope it will never change.

One of the more fascinating things about such a small place is the number of people who have called it home for decades. They might have left for a short period, but somehow found a way to come back, and not necessarily for retirement, either. These are the people who have made our little slice of paradise what it is and what we love about it - the people, as well as the beautiful forest and mountains. And truth be known, most of us never had so many good friends.

They may not have done anything you could point to as changing the course of history, but they set the tone, like; we have no McDonalds or Kentucky Colonels, no 7-11's, no Motel 6's, no Supercuts, no ski slopes—not even a Walmart. Have you been to Big Bear lately?

In order to better bring the story of Idyllwild to life in terms of its people we're going to follow the real life story of two families, both with names you will probably recognize. ANOTHER ANNUAL MEETING ROLLS AROUND

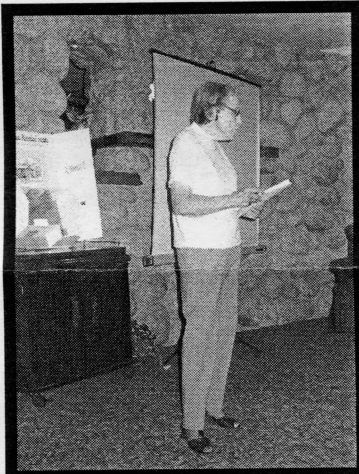

After Bob Smith introduced Dr. Mary, she told us everything we ever wanted to know about the Hemet Lake Dam, including facts about the builders, the actual construction, and the purpose of forming the lake by building the dam. Among many other things, she also told us that the dam was built in 1895 and took four years to complete. Just getting the right type of cement to use in the dam is a story in itself. The closest source was in Belgium, which meant that it had to be shipped by sailing vessel across the Atlantic to the southern tip of South America, around the Horn into the Pacific and then up to San Francisco, where it was put on a train and taken to the foot of the San Jacintos. From there it was all horse and wagon. As luck would have it, the lake went completely dry just after the dam was completed. Every effort was made to keep this a secret, but the news got out anyway.

In the very early days a water wheel was installed where the dam emptied into a creek, which was used to generate electricity for Hemet residents and businesses, Dr. Mary said.

She also said the Hemet Lake campground didn't open until 1933, but that campers could not swim in the lake even though the water was only for agricultural use.

ADVENTURES OF THE OATES FAMILY

William Oates was the first on the scene. He loved driving up here from Glendale in his spiffy new Model T Ford, bouncing along over the steep dirt roads, stopping now and then to let the radiator cool down, and maybe changing a tire or two on occasion, but none of that stopped him from building a cabin here in 1926.

He had a son named Robert who made his first trip to Idyllwild in 1927 and, along with his brother, Walt, attended Idyllwild School off and on. At that time the school consisted of just one room.

In 1941 Robert and several of his pals, out on the town at the Idyllwild Inn, happened to seat themselves at a table served by Janice Hanson, one of a group of high school girls from Elsinore who spent their summers living in a

ADVENTURES OF THE KRETSINGER FAMILY

George's parents, Charlie and Evelyn Kretsinger were married in Kansas City Missouri in 1933. Just three years later they packed up and moved to Idyllwild where, in 1936, Charlie built the first of two homes on South Circle Drive. At the same time, Charlie started his own plumbing business, a trade he had learned as a 14 year old in Kansas City.

About nine years later Evelyn gave birth to a son, whom they named George.

Little George was about 2 months old when he first settled down in Idyllwild. His first three years were largely uneventful, but not long after his fourth birthday the Idyllwild School was in the process of starting the kindergarten class for that year, but because of the

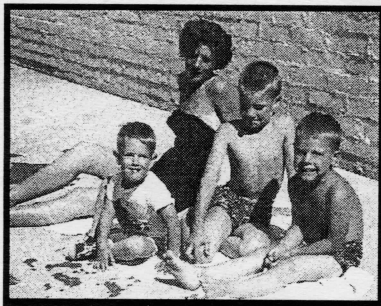

group home and working at the Inn. On his second attempt to get a date with her she agreed, and they were married the following year.

In 1944 Robert joined the US Navy and was assigned to an amphibious unit which took part in several assault landings on Japanese held Islands in the South Pacific. He was discharged in 1946 and not long after began a career as a singer and actor in western films.

In 1950, the year the Korean War started, Jan Oates gave birth to the second of three sons, in Glendale, California. They named him Robin. Then, nine years later, when Robin was just starting the 5th grade, the family moved to Idyllwild from Glendale, fulfilling a dream made possible by Robin's dad, Robert, realizing he could continue his business as a conservation consultant while

living in Idyllwild, just as well as he could living in Glendale.

Lucky for him, Robin's family had no sooner moved back to Idyllwild than Elvis Presley showed up to make a movie called *The Gull-and-Kid*. As it turned out, the movie script called for all kinds of

extras, especially kids, which meant that dozens of them, including Robin, could brag for the rest of their lives that they were indeed actors in a movie starring Elvis.

After graduating from Idyllwild School, which at that time looked about like it does today, Robin went on to Hemet High School, which meant, of course, taking the bus to and from Hemet every day.

Soon after graduation Robin was drafted into the US Army where he served for two years, spending most of that time in Germany.

Sarah Fisher was born in 1953 to O.J. and Emily Fisher in San Diego. The family moved to Idyllwild in 1964 when Sarah was eleven years old. It was quite a shock to the family when they found themselves wading through three feet of snow on the ground after just leaving their former home near the beach.

Sarah enrolled in Idyllwild School as a sixth grader, then, as most Idyllwild kids must, rode the school bus down the Hill every morning to Hemet High, then back up in the afternoon to the bus stop in front of what was then the Alpine Market and Alpine Bakery (now the Creekstone Inn). It just happened that Robin's parents owned the building and his mother, Jan, ran the bakery. Imagine the kids, after the long ride up the Hill, getting off the bus within easy smelling distance of fresh bakery goods.

shortage of five year olds, they couldn't justify hiring a kindergarten teacher unless they could find a few more students. But they had a solution. Maybe George was one year too young to be officially eligible for kindergarten, but up here in the mountains, rules were made to be bent a little, and so little George began his education one year early.

But that didn't last long because a short time afterward the family packed up and went back to Nebraska where George's father worked in a plant manufacturing war materials during the Korean War. Ten years later, when George was 14 years old, the family returned to Idyllwild and the plumbing business.

Soon after arriving, George began attending Hemet High School and graduated in 1963. During his high school days George had a great time, as did most teenagers in Idyllwild. To begin with, he had a part time job as a short order cook at the Idyllhoff Restaurant, which was part of a recreation complex called "Sportland." Located in the center of town, it included a five lane bowling alley, a swimming pool, a skating rink, a trampoline, an outdoor snack bar, outdoor jukebox, four pool tables, and some pinball machines. That gave George a chance to make some extra money by working as a bowling alley pin setter, which paid 25 cents a line. It also meant he could use all of the facilities without having to pay. No wonder he had a swell time.

Along with George's 1963 high school graduation came the Senior Prom and George asked a young lady and fellow senior, Jackie Bassett, to be his date. Jackie said yes and during that same year said yes again, this time to a proposal of marriage.

And so it was that in 1963, the same year they graduated from high school, George and Jackie were married.

Jackie was born in San Diego where her dad, Hugh, had his own refrigerator repair business. When Jackie was

a child, her father and mother, MaryAnn, moved to Hemet, where Jackie attended school. One year after the wedding and setting up housekeeping in Idyllwild, Brian was born, and two years after that Jackie gave birth to their daughter, Becky,

who is now a school teacher in Temecula.

George soon joined his father, Charlie, and brother, Chuck, in their Idyllwild plumbing business, which is still

BEHIND THE SCENES AND RECENT RESEARCH PROJECTS

Memories from childhood, be it the location of a summer camp attended, the identity of a favorite swimming pool, or the whereabouts of an old family cabin, regularly spark an inquiry to IAHS.

Sometimes it's from an interested buyer, wondering about the background of an appealing property. Or it may be from a professional historian or archaeologist doing research. Our archive is rich enough to let us answer questions small and large. Of the 16 inquiries fielded so far this year, these were especially significant:

- Gurk Ilbay, an Idyllwild Arts student from Turkey, came to IAHS for information on the **history of movie-making in Idyllwild** for a documentary film he produced, "Hollywood and Pine." We consulted with him over a period of 18 months, made archive material available for filming, and hosted on-camera interviews in the museum.

- IAHS member and Mt. San Jacinto State Park naturalist Sharen Metz was looking for **photos of the Civilian Conservation Corps projects in the Great Depression**, to use in celebrating the 75th anniversary of the CCC this past June. Sharen and Bob Smith searched both the state park and IAHS archives, finding numerous photos to enrich each other's collections. Adele Smith discovered on eBay several local CCC photos for the celebration. In return MSJSP granted IAHS a book-signing booth.
- Tanya Rathbun Sorrell and Bill Bell of LSA Associates, contractors to Riverside County for evaluation of the potential for establishing an Idyllwild Historic District, approached IAHS for **old maps, photos, and other information about early commercial structures**. We opened our archive to them and provided consultation during the project.

George's father, Charlie, and his mother Evelyn. Charlie first came to Idyllwild in 1936

serving Idyllwild to this day.

In 1963, the same year George graduated from high school and got married, he also joined the Idyllwild Fire Department as a Paid Call Firefighter, and he continued in that capacity until 1998 – a total of 34 years!

Seven years later, in 1970, George ran for a seat on the board of directors of the Idyllwild Water Company,

and, at 24, became the youngest board member to be elected to that position. He served until 1984, took a short break, then resumed as a board member between 1988 and 1990. In that same year, 1970, George also joined the local Lions Club and served as a member of that organization for 30 years.

And one more thing: George was a member of the IFPD Fire Commission from 2000 to 2006.

Meanwhile, Jackie, in addition to being a mom, be-

came a real estate agent in 1977 and started working for Grace Curnow Realty. Then, in 1988, she started her own real estate company, Village Properties. But that didn't stop Jackie from becoming active in the PTA and helping with her kids softball teams. George's brother Chuck retired from the family business about eight years ago and George retired

two years ago, turning the company over to son, Brian, who is now the third generation owner of the Kretsinger Plumbing company. Brian lives in Idyllwild with his wife, Stacy, and their ten month old son, Griffin.

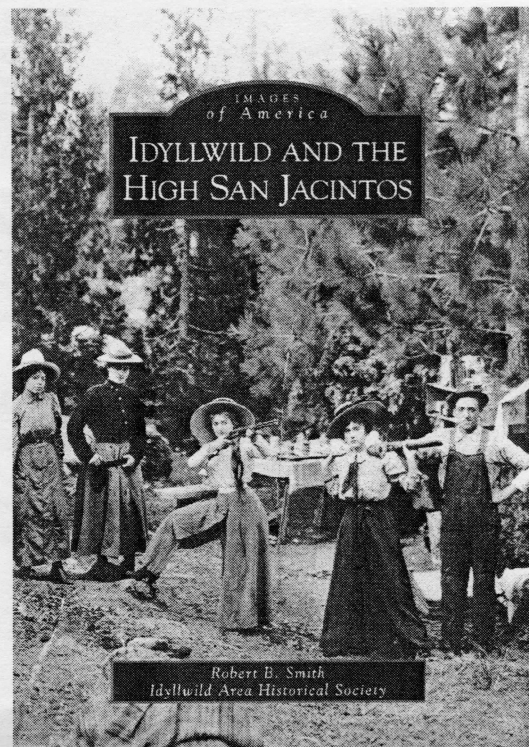

Sarah said that growing up in Idyllwild was like living in Mayberry, the small town featured in the Andy Griffith show. Everybody knew everybody, and the Sheriff's deputy, Hollis C. Hollis, a wonderful man, was a pretty close match to Barney Fife.

She said one of the most exciting things the kids did in the winter was to ride their sleds from Humber Park all the way down Fern Valley Road to South Circle Drive – right in the middle of the road, at night! Another favorite nighttime activity was throwing pinecones at bats. She and her girlfriends also spent a lot of time riding horses bareback in bare feet. She didn't mention Opie, but he was probably around somewhere. .

Although Sarah and Robin had known each other for some time it wasn't until 1971, after Sarah's graduation from High School and Robin's completion of his stint in the Army, that they began to notice each other with more than causal interest.

Robin had began working as a waiter at the Chart House Restaurant at about the same time and continued working there until 1977, when he went to work for

Sarah's dad, O.J. Fisher, as a real estate agent. Landing that job was relatively easy since he and Sarah had run off to Las Vegas to get married in 1974.

Daughter Stacy was born in 1975, then Ethan in 1978. Ethan now lives in Santa Cruz where he works for a company that makes video games.

Robin continued selling real estate and in 1998 established his own company, Robin Oates Reality.

After Stacy and Ethan grew up and moved out, Sarah needed something to do, so she took up the art of creating stained glass and today is a well known artist in that field.

Today, Stacy works for her dad selling real estate, and lives in Idyllwild with her husband, Brian Kretsinger, and their 10 month old son, Griffin.

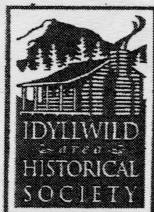
