has contributed to their knowledge and appreciation of this area. Visitors have also commented on how well informed our volunteer staff is.

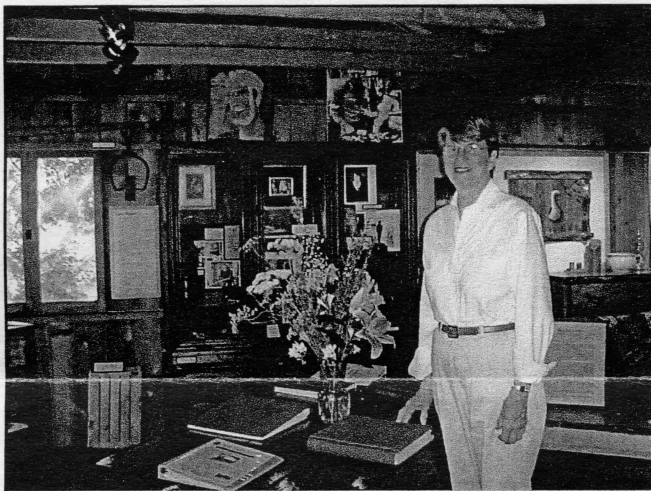

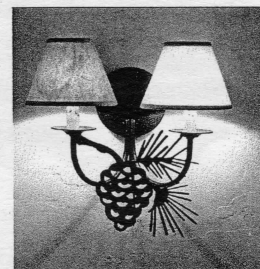

EXTRACTS FROM RIVERSIDE PRESS

W. B. Clancy, president of the Citizens Bank: "I consider Palm Canyon and the adjacent country and the San Jacinto Mountains as among the most valuable assets of Riverside county. They are more unique and more beautiful than some of the really famous tourist resort features of the country; and they should be made accessible, be developed and be advertised to the fullest possible extent. They are undeveloped resources and we ought to make the best of them."

A. D. Shamel, United States Department of Agriculture: "I have had the privilege of climbing to the summit of Mount San Jacinto, of visiting the Tahquitz Valley and of spending some time at Idyllwild; and I do not hesitate to say that these are among the most interesting and beautiful spots that I have had the pleasure of seeing. The view from the summit of the peak is unsurpassed so far as the United States is concerned. Nowhere else can we duplicate the view of a desert and a sea below sea level, of high mountains and fertile valleys; of Lake Elsinore, glistening like a gem, and of the distant ocean and still more distant islands. Few Riversiders realize the resort possibilities of this mountain section."

OUT OF THE PAST

The following was handed to us by Dr. W. S. Philip, of Los Angeles, and which is an incident which happened in Idyllwild about nineteen years ago when he and a party of friends had an interesting adventure:

RAIN IMPRISONS PICNICKERS AT IDYLLWILD

IDYLLWILD, Aug. 27.—Imprisoned in a cave with a rain-swollen stream in front and the water running higher every minute was a party of picnickers who went from here Friday morning. Dr. W. S. Philip, of Los Angeles started early with six Los Angeles friends for Dark Canyon. This is a wild point about half way between here and Banning. The party reached their destination, and while eating lunch thunder began to roll and the rain to fall. To the great joy of all, Dr. Philip discovered a cave a short

distance away in a cliff that overhung a mountain stream. The cave has a room about thirty feet wide by forty feet long. A cheering fire was soon burning, and with the rain pouring outside everybody was happy and the Doctor imagined himself at the head of a band of pirates. Soon that peaceful stream began to assume threatening proportions, and after a couple of hours the rain stopped and the stream kept growing until it was impossible for the party to get out. They philosophically prepared to meet the inevitable and stay all night. The moon came out, the stream grew smaller, and about nine o'clock the doctor led his party out. They mounted their horses and in about two hours more they saw the welcome camp fires here..

IDYLLWILD FESTIVAL OF PAN

The Pipes of Pan were heard in the mountains at Idyllwild (San Jacinto Mountains) on Saturday evening, August 22nd, when Miss Norma Gould, of the Norma Gould School of the Dance, Los Angeles, with fourteen of her professional dancers, gave an unusual entertainment in the form of her Dance Festival portraying symbolic dances of Ancient Greece, Egypt, Japan, Spain, Poland, Arabia, etc. The Idyllwild Recreation Grove was the scene of the performance, and made a fitting theater, the stage being levelled ground for the dancers; the surroundings of forest pines and cedars, the ferns, the grassy slopes, the stream in the background, and the starry sky, all combined to make an ideal and romantic spot in the great outdoors for this wonderful "Festival of Pan." This was the very first of its kind to be held in the Grove Bowl, so that it was also an initial opening of the Idyllwild Recreation Grove. The program was unique and varied, the dancers gracefully portraying their parts with professional skill. The synopsis was read by Miss Norma Gould, giving an outline of the story and the names of the characters. The following poem, which was written by Miss Marjorie Dougan, was read by Miss Gould as part of the prologue:

Nearly 250 visitors viewed the exhibit and overwhelmingly expressed their pleasure for the art show and finding "a little jewel of a museum" as a bonus!

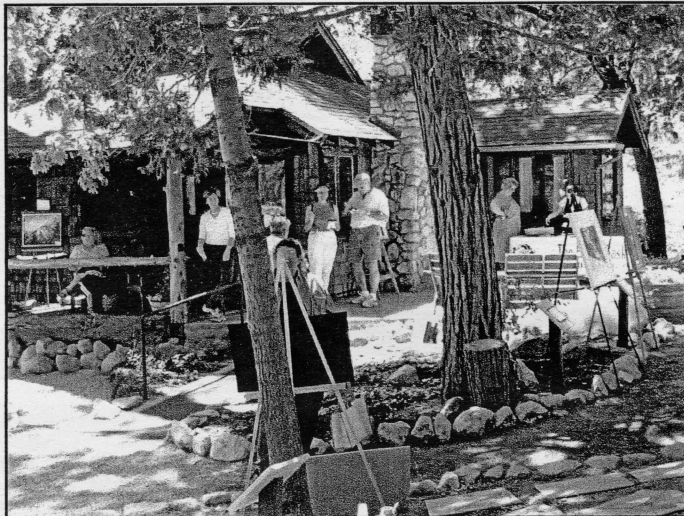

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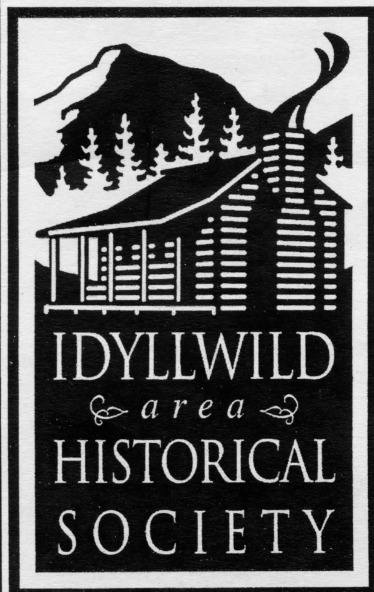
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
